ST LAWRENCE MATTERS

As many of you know, long term Bigbury resident Helen Smith died at the end of November, and her well attended funeral was one of two in December at St Lawrence. Helen was a church warden and supported St Lawrence in many ways over the years. She will be much missed in our congregation and parish.

Just when we thought it was safer and the church was getting back to its usual rhythm of services, omicron struck and with it, new restrictions. Services are unaffected but we have to worship in masks, and the post services refreshments have been suspended to avoid unmasked close contact.

On the building front work is well and truly underway! The church has taken on a pagoda like appearance with the scaffolding, and the contractors, Barley Manor, are busy raking out the old cement mortar pointing in preparation for re-

pointing in lime mortar. Lime mortar is now specified for heritage buildings, as it allows the joints between the stones to 'breathe' and being softer than cement mortar it means that slight movement can be taken up, rather than producing cracks as has already happened in the tower.

Representatives of the bell-hangers, Nicholson of Bridport, have visited and we now know the internal work on the tower required prior to bells removal, programmed for 14th February. (See the photo of rep, looking at bells from above). We are still looking for volunteers to assist with the bells removal (keeps the costs down!) – you need to be fit and have your own safety footwear (steel toe-capped), all other PPE will be provided.

On the money side we are negotiating further funding from the Heritage Stimulus Fund through the good offices of Historic England and the National Churches Trust – this is to cover overruns due mainly to inflation and the unexpectedly high cost of the scaffolding. The snag is that any funding will need to be spent by the end of March – the end of the financial year. Much depends on the weather and the ability to use lime mortar. In an ideal world we would wait for warmer weather but we do not have that option, so we have to press on and hope the South Hams winter is kind to us.

Meaning

The five church buildings which are linked together in the Modbury Mission Community are all buildings with varying sizes of spires. Over the many centuries some of these spires have been struck by lightning, repointed and rebuilt, hidden vicars on the run in the English Civil war and one of them hit by a Luftwaffe bomb.

At the moment the tower and spire at St Lawrence's Church, Bigbury, are covered in scaffolding, as work is ongoing to make it watertight and re-hang the bells so they can once again ring out across the parish.

Last year someone showed me an original sea chart from around the late 17th century. The part of the map they showed me was the coast around Bigbury bay. And on this chart was marked St Lawrence's spire, so seafarers on their boats in the Channel could mark where they were and safely make their way through the seas along this coast and onto their destination.

And in many ways that is what these church buildings represent. The church is a place for the community in the past, the community at the present and the community in the future, to help us make our way through this life in the company of God's love and into eternity. At its best a church building is a place where the big questions of life can start to make sense.

Don't you find that life can be utterly perplexing at times? Isn't there a distinct scarcity in substantial, proven wisdom in this world – truth that makes life work, that cracks open the puzzle of the meaning of life and destroys the fear of death? Where would you look for that? Maybe the Christian church is the last place you'd look. Or maybe it's the place to start to look.

LAST WORDS for HELEN SMITH



One cold, bright day in March 1982, a woman could be seen fighting her way through the brambles and nettles that had all but engulfed the Rectory in Bigbury. She was trying to look in through the windows and imagine herself living there.

The Rectory had been empty for some time, and was to be put up for sale by the Church of England. Helen Smith had been fascinated by the particulars, and although her husband had already said he did not want to live in Bigbury, she was determined to have a look at the house. It seems that some Bigbury magic, that we have all felt from time to time must have touched Helen, because she convinced her husband Roland that this was the place they should buy as their retirement home. Within a year they had moved in, having had people in to sort out both the house and the garden - including adding the beautiful pink exterior paintwork which Helen so loved, and which somehow came to be a hallmark of the Smiths' residence there.

The house is spacious and welcoming,

and the garden a delight, and for some forty years they have been the venue for a multitude of get togethers, such as dinners, garden parties and the loved Victorian Tea party, nearly all held to raise funds for St Lawrence Church and other local causes.

Prior to this, Helen had retired from her role as Bursar of Training for Lloyds Bank in Hindhead, initially so that she could provide support for her own mother and Roland's mother, in their dotage. She performed the roles of carer, homemaker and gardener with the same gusto that we all came to expect from her her in her many and varied roles in Bigbury over the years. She was once described, with great affection, together with Mary Smallwood and Sally Mitchell as one of the village's matriarchs.

Initially, Helen and Roland divided their time between a home in Cyprus, and the Rectory. During one of their stays in Bigbury, Mary Smallwood invited Helen to take part in the annual summer show, and compete in the flower arranging and cookery sections.

That was the beginning of Helen's committed support of the parish of Bigbury and all its many events and groups of kindred spirits. She was soon co-opted on to the committee, and before long was its chairman. The same happened with the WI in Bigbury (sadly no longer functioning), and she was for many years Chairman of the local Conservative group, and was highly respected by the group in the whole South Hams. She was a long time member of theSt. Lawrence Church parochial council, and latterly one of its Church Wardens. The current Bigbury Ladies group came about years ago when Helen's Bigbury on Sea friends complained they did not see her often enough, so she set up, through the Parish Magazine, a monthly Bigbury Girls coffee morning, hosted at her house. As ever, all were welcome. It has since evolved into the current Bigbury Ladies, largely run by Pam, Rita, Chris and Jean. This is just one example of Helen's gift for getting people together and engendering a genuine sense of community.

After Roland died, these strong links with the community, and her involvement with so many of the movers and shakers meant that Helen never planned to leave. It is well to remember that she was nearing 90 when she began to hand over the reigns of these groups. She was an inspiration to us all, a true 'pillar of the community', and very dearly loved. She will be sadly missed by us all.

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
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McBAR'S JARS.


like a nun - with big hands of course. Then she was off. She took a taxi up to Glasgow for COP 26. A real 60 fags a day gal. We loved her!

ISLAND ASSEMBLY



We estimate that 500 people assembled on the sands in front of Burgh Island for Bigbury Net Zero's **Beach Assembly** in November 2021. It is very easy to enjoy our stunning scenery and believe that all is well with the world. We wanted to raise awareness of the impending, irreversible climate change and catastrophic loss of biodiversity. Our outreach following this event though newspapers and social media has continued to build momentum and support. More events such as this are being planned for 2022.

Local towns and villages are already coming together under the umbrella of **Sustainable South Hams** to share resources and ideas. Their ambition is to reverse the decline in nature in our parishes and investigate how we can improve from being islands of 'non-sustainable villages' into wider 'sustainable' communities.' Parish boundaries now appear insignificant when the impact of failure to reduce fossil fuel consumption and reverse the loss of natural habitats, affects us all. The need to cooperate has never been more important. Our financial and human resources are limited and there is very little time left to act and make meaningful reductions in our parish footprints.

We are delighted to have the support of **Giles Fuchs** and the Burgh Island Hotel, who are sponsoring the **Island Assembly on Monday 21st February**. The purpose of this event is to inspire cooperation between groups which have the potential to design and develop ambitious community-led projects to increase natural habitats and reduce our carbon footprints.

The invitation-only Island Assembly is a gathering of interested parties which will be recorded and delegates will be interviewed by **Andrew Kay** of Bauer Media. Recordings will be shared on social media. These videos will allow thousands more people 'into the room' to see, hear and feel what happened at the Island Assembly.

A follow up event at **Bigbury Golf Club** on **Thursday 24th February** will provide an opportunity for 50 more people to come together the meet other players, form alliances and take more steps in the right direction. (see p 5)

With the media interest that we have gathered, this is likely to prove to be a ground-breaking model for 'Community COPs' encouraging communities to work together to complement local government initiatives. By joining forces we believe we can make the progress needed to 'keep 1.5 deg alive'.

Inspirational speakers of international note will be amongst the delegates and we are inviting Devon's local government (**Devon County Council**, **District Councillors** and **SHDC Parish Councillors**) to attend. Leading South Hams businesses and regional organisations (South Devon **AONB** and **Devon Wildlife Trust**) will be there to showcase their successful climate and nature projects within the South Hams. The Directors of **Carbon Savvy** and the **Farm Carbon Toolkit** will launch their parish focused initiatives and promote their carbon footprint calculators. Delegates will write their **Letters to the Earth** before they attend the Assembly under the management of **Kay Michaels**



ISLAND MURMURATION

to form seriously impressive flocks.

Many people will have seen the stunning murmuration of starlings this year at Bigbury-on-Sea. Each evening just before dusk, smaller flocks began congregating over the island, swooping elegantly above the causeway, racing past the Pilchard and resting on the field above the hotel. As new flocks arrived they seemed to melt into the larger flock with amazing ease. No collisions. How does that happen? Thousands of birds, without rehearsal, seem to be able to choreograph such incredible aerial acrobatics. Finally they would all roost together in one or other of the cedars outside the hotel.

Why do starling murmurations form? Starlings are known as 'partial migrants': birds that migrate in some places but not in others. Our own starlings tend to stay put while those from colder countries in eastern Europe head to our shores, swelling our numbers during autumn and winter


Scientists believe that murmurations offer safety in numbers; protection from predators like peregrine falcons that are attracted by the sheer number of birds. After all, it can't be easy to single out just one starling from a whirling group of hundreds or even thousands! Experts still aren't completely sure how each starling knows which way to turn without bumping into the others.

Murmurations always form over the birds' communal roosting site. As the number of starlings reaches its peak and the last of the daylight begins to fade, an unspoken signal seems to tell the group to funnel towards the ground with one last sweeping motion and calming whoosh of wings. Roosts can be anything from a reedbed to a seaside pier where the group can huddle together for warmth and chatter about the best feeding grounds.

Forty people, including several from Bigbury, attended the talk given by our **Bigbury Watch** team, **Eamonn and Lynda Brynes** at the Ringmore WI Hall in January. Eamonn and Lynda gave an inspirational and very personal talk about their lives in the Metropolitan Police Force during the Maggie Thacher years. They were in the front line and were both courageous and committed to helping others. Linda was a runner in her youth and described a selfless act of bravery when she chased off 15 youths in the Nottinghill Riots until a squad car pulled up along side her and ordered her to jump inside for her own safety! Eamonn and Linda not only lost friends, who were their colleagues, in the Harrods Bombings but Eamonn narrowly escaped with his life.

There were several former police in the audience that night as well as family members. We were all so very grateful to people like Eamonn and Linda who go the extra mile and their only explanation (given by Linda in her talk) is that "I wanted to help people".

The marshals at our Beach Assembly last November were mostly retired police force people, who still keep giving and still want to help people. Eamonn and Linda had no trouble getting a six strong team together from neighbouring villages and towns.

VOLUNTEERS NEEDED FOR LOCAL FIRE CREW





In spite of the Kingston fire engine being nearby, this crew was not able to attend the fire described in Kevan Debonnaire's letter (opposite).

Paul White explained that two of the crew had injuries from their normal 'day jobs' which meant that the Kingston crew had insufficient members to provide a service. Currently there are only four crew members. Ideally the crew should have a team of about 7 volunteers from whom to draw in an emergency call out.

Our local communities fought long and hard to stave off the closing of the Kingston fire service in 2019 because fire spreads very fast and needs the emergency services to attend quickly. Holiday traffic and narrow lanes mean that we have suffered many traffic jams on the way to Bigbury on Sea.

Volunteers can work/reside in St Ann's Chapel, Kingston, Bigbury, Bigbury-on-Sea, Ringmore, Challaborough or Easton.




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

Just like the **Sustainable Community Locality Fund**, this fund provides each
District Councillor with a budget to
enable them to support a wide range of
projects to help us tackle our Climate and
Ecological Emergency Declarations. The
project should meet one of the objectives

- Reducing carbon emissions from households, businesses or organisations, including community and voluntary groups

- Projects which will result in removal of carbon from the atmosphere through nature-based solutions or supporting improvements in biodiversity
- Providing education and awareness of the Climate and Ecological emergency through direct engagement with hard to reach groups and individuals
- Projects which aim to help communities and species adapt to the effects of Climate Change
- Projects to help reduce organisational carbon footprints

Each Councillor has a budget of £3,000 until March 2022 to help not for private profit groups or organisations to deliver community projects that benefit their Ward or the wider local area.

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Home Scheme To Cut Bills and Carbon Is Still Available

18 January 2022

A £900,000 scheme to reduce home energy consumption in the South Hams is underway. The first installations of measures including air source heating systems and external insulation are now being carried out through South Hams District Council's Green Home Grant. Further funding to help home owners improve the energy efficiency of their home is still available, however time is limited and funding is likely to stop in April.

90 eligible homeowners across the District are having the energy- and money-saving work carried out over the next few months. Insulation, such as solid/single wall external insulation, is one of the measures being installed as well as fitting air source heat pump central heating systems (a kind of renewable energy technology that takes the warmth from the air outside, even when it's freezing and uses it to heat the home). As well as being better for the planet, it's estimated that using an air source heat pump could cut as much as £900 a year from energy bills. External wall insulation also brings significant energy bill savings, up to an estimated £415 a year.

The cost of the eco-friendly work is fully-covered after the Council obtained funding from the Department for Business, Energy and Industrial Strategy (BEIS). To make it easier for local people to access the

money and reduce their carbon footprint, the team at the Council has taken control to oversee the whole process, from the initial application to connecting homeowners with contractors. As well as letting people know about the grant in the media and on social media, the Council team also wrote to everyone living in suitable properties with an EPC rating of E or below. Cllr Jonathan Hawkins, South Hams District Council's Executive Member for Leisure Health and Wellbeing said:

"We're committed to doing everything we can to help our residents to reduce their carbon footprint and save money whilst staying warm. We know that not everyone enjoys filling out forms and we were concerned that local people could miss out on this great opportunity. That's why we decided we would take the lead and take steps to make sure the maximum number of local people can benefit from this scheme."

How do air source heating systems work?

Air source heat pumps use the same type of technology that keeps your fridge cold. A liquid refrigerant that has a very low boiling point is pumped on a loop between two heat exchangers. This refrigerant takes on heat energy from the outside ambient air temperature and turns into a gas as it warms up. This gas is then compressed back into a liquid, which increases its temperature further. The warm refrigerant then goes through a heat exchanger, which transfers the warmth to a separate body of water for circulating round the

central heating system. During the final stage the liquid refrigerant goes through an expansion valve reducing the pressure and temperature and the cycle repeats. As heat pumps transfer heat rather than produce it, their efficiency can be greater than 300%.

Who is eligible for the grant?

To be eligible for the Green Homes Grant, you must meet the criteria below:

- Owner Occupier (sorry this scheme is not open to housing association tenants)
- EPC of E or below (please speak to us if you do not know or not have one)
- Be on either means tested benefit or a net household income of less £30,000 a year (this is after household expenses such as mortgage, Council tax, utility bills)

Session 1: Carbon footprints

What is the carbon cycle? What is contraction and convergence, and how does it link global, national and local carbon reductions? What are top-down and bottom-up carbon footprints, and why is bottom-up more useful? What role can councils, businesses and individuals play? What are the ten biggest actions to we can take to save CO2, and can they improve our quality of life?

Session 2 - Transport

How will we get transport to net zero? What are the merits of different power sources? How do different types of transport compare? How much difference do size and fuel make in cars, and how long should I keep my car? What's so amazing about e-bikes, and how can we make our journeys better for health and wellbeing?

Session 3 - Shopping

How can individuals influence manufacturing? How can we reduce the footprint of products by 80%? What is embodied energy, and how important are product miles? What are the rules of thumb for low-carbon shopping, and what is the ancient Indian BUD factor? How do the products we use affect our quality of life?

Session 4 - Holidays

How can we get the most out of our holidays? What are the most common holiday objectives, and how can we achieve them with a small carbon footprint? How far can I travel by different forms of transport on a tonne of CO2? What are the carbon footprints of different kinds of holiday and activity? How can low-carbon holidays raise our quality of life?

Session 5 – Quality of life

What do we mean by quality of life, and how does it connect to saving CO2? How can we monitor our quality of life and track it over time? What do psychologists say makes us happy and doesn't make us happy? How can lowering your footprint raise your quality of life and save money? What does Happy Planet Indexing say about happiness and sustainable living?

Session 6 - Heating

What are the principles of a carbon-neutral home? How does the UK government plan to get Britain's homes to net zero? How much heat is lost through each area of a typical home, and how can we conserve heat in buildings old and new? What does 'ready for retrofit' mean? What are the merits of new heating systems such as biofuel boilers and air-source heat pumps?

Session 7 - Food

What kind of food supports the highest quality of life? Why does an organic carrot from Kenya have a smaller footprint than a non-organic carrot from the UK? What is low-carbon meat, and why is UK meat better than international meat? How can I buy low-carbon food? Why is farming going to avert climate change, and how will carbon farming increase nutrition, sequester CO2 and earn farmers more money?

Session 8 - Carbon offsetting

What is carbon offsetting, and how does it work? Can offsets help us out of the crisis, or do they only contribute to the problem? A brief analysis of genuine versus false offsets, and how to make offsetting work for you by using appropriate time frames. Why supporting a variety of projects whose offsets will vary over time makes more sense.

RECOMMENDATION

When Bigbury Net Zero had its inaugural meeting at Venus Cafe, a participant explained that we "need to be better informed, so we know what the problems are and how we can do our bit to solve them"

I went on the Carbon Savvy's 'Carbon Ambassadors Course last year because I felt the same inadequacies. I was sponsored to go on this course by **Bigbury** Parish Council. Two other parishioners were also able to attend that course. It was a live, face-to-face, Zoom training course. If you cannot attend the actual course as its during the day on Fridays - this is not a problem. The course is recorded and you will be sent a link so that you can watch it at your leisure. You can also watch the topic several times (so it sinks in!).

It is a complex issue and you often hear very conflicting views about topics such as renewable energy and de-carbonisation. There is also a lot of jargon involved.

If you would like to help organise a community group to work together on a particular theme, or to promote and encourage parish-wide or inter-parish action - but don't feel 'qualified' to do this....then the Carbon Ambassadors' Course is just right for you.

Do you know someone on another parish who might be interested in this training? Please let them know about it. The more people who feel confident about the facts, the more likely we are to make a difference before 2030 - only 8 years away.


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
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
