





BIGBURY MEMORIAL HALL

Bringing the Community Together

We hope that we shall be able to open the Hall very soon. The Committee has worked hard to make the Hall a safe place to visit by carrying out the recommendations of ACRE (Action with Communities in Rural England) and GOV>UK about the re-opening of community halls.

We have carried out risk assessments, bought sanitisers and other hand washing and drying facilitators and given the Hall a thorough clean. Users will be told about the one way system in the Hall, social distancing and there will be posters reminding people where they can and cannot go.

Although the kitchen facilities will be available, users must bring their own crockery and cutlery. The main toilets will be out of commission but the disabled toilet can be used. Entry will be through the front door and exit via the fire door on the opposite side of the Hall. We plan to ensure that the Hall is a safe place to go to and that you enjoy your visit there.

It is hoped that a sale in aid of the **Tower & Bells Fund** on **December 5th and 6th** will be the first event to take place at the Hall since March but, of course, this will depend upon any government restrictions in place after December 2nd. This is being organised by **Louise and Henry Wainwright** and **Jill Gubbins.**

If all goes well with this event, and enough people are prepared to attend, we shall look at organising something else early in the New Year.

Finally, notwithstanding the pandemic, the **Bigbury Produce Show** took place on-line in September. See a photo (below) of a proud **Elaine Gilbert**, holding the **Produce Cup**!





Get a free NHS test to check if you have coronavirus You can have a swab test to check if you have coronavirus (COVID-19) now. You can only get a free NHS test if at least one of the following applies:

- you have a high temperature
- you have a **NEW continuous** cough
- you've lost your sense of smell or taste or it's changed
- you've been asked to by a local council
- you're taking part in a government pilot project
- You can also get a test for someone you live with if they have symptoms.

If you're going into hospital

You may need to get tested if you're due to have surgery or a procedure. The hospital will arrange this for you. Contact your hospital department if you have any questions.

Who cannot get a free test

You **cannot get a free NHS test** unless you have symptoms, have been asked to by your local council, live in England and have been told to by your hospital, or are taking part in a government pilot project. **This applies even if:**

- you live with someone who has coronavirus
- you've had close contact with someone who has coronavirus
- you've come to the UK from a high risk country
- you're planning to leave the country
- your employer or school has asked you to get a test
- You can pay for a private test. Do not use this service.

When to get a test

If you have symptoms, **get a test as soon as possible.** Book a visit to a **test site** to have the test today. Test sites are open 7 days a week. Order a **home test kit** if you cannot get to a test site.

You need to get the test done in the first 8 days of having symptoms. On days 1 to 7, you can get tested at a site or at home. If you're ordering a home test kit on day 7, do it by 3pm. On day 8, you need to go to a test site - it's too late to order a home test kit

If no tests are available online, do not call helplines to get a test. No extra tests are available through the helplines.

If you have other problems using the online service, call: 119 Lines are open 7am to 11pm.

Stay at home if you have symptoms

If you're getting a test because you have symptoms, **you and anyone you live with must self-isolate until you get your result**. This **also applies to anyone in your support bubble** (where someone who lives alone - or just with their children - can meet people from 1 other household).

You must also self-isolate if you cannot get a test.

What the test involves

The test involves taking a swab of the inside of your nose and the back of your throat, using a long cotton bud. You can do the swab yourself (if you are aged 12 or over) or someone can do it for you. Parents or guardians have to swab test children aged 11 or under.

THE CHURCH BELLS OF ST. LAWRENCE



FROM THE ARCHIVES

The **Bigbury History Society** had hoped to have the archives on display this autumn with interested local being invited to see what we have in store. We inherited them from **Roger Grimley** a couple or so years ago and I have been trying to familiarize myself with them, to arrange them and to start the process of recording them.

Sadly, because of the Covid restrictions, this has to be delayed as we anticipate very few people will risk visiting the Hall to view the documents.

They are quite wide ranging and include some original documents from the last two hundred years as well as reproductions of earlier ones. More recent history is covered by pieces and even house adverts from local newspapers, and there are a series of specific articles collated by the History Society over the years.

One particular set of documents of interest to me was the Woodleigh Deanery Magazine from the 1900s. Each vicar in this part of south Devon was invited to provide weekly updates of what happened in his parish and our incumbent from 1904-16, the Reverend Bowden-Smith was not slow to report what was occurring in the decade up to the Great War. He obviously had his own strongly held viewsvery patriotic, very disparaging about the new bungalow town at Bigbury--on- Sea. His notes inevitably focus on the activities of the church, but it was an era when much of village life was centered on the church.

It was his reporting of the repairing of the church bells in 1908 that led me to write this inaugural piece for the Bigbury News at the very time when there is again fund raising gathering momentum for the restoration of the same bells in St Lawrence church.

However, my journey through the Archives has taken me beyond the restoration of 1908 and has led me to consider the place of village church bells, bell-ringing in **Devon**, the **Iron Industry** in the Kingsbridge area and also to highlight the extraordinary story of **Harry Barden**, a local but also a prominent Devon bell-ringer for 55 years or so. His story will be the subject of a future article once lockdown has ended.

The original 5 bells in 1788

The first time the Bigbury Church Bells are mentioned in our archives is when 5 bells were cast and installed by the established iron foundry firm of Pennington's from Exeter in 1788. However, Peter Cook, in his forthcoming History of the Church of St. Lawrence, suggests there was a disastrous 1325 belfry report, implying there were indeed bells in the C14th Tower. T hat is very likely as the earliest church bells would have been in the pre-Conquest monastic churches. As church bells became more widespread they were used as a form of mass communication (a medieval Bigbury Drums) conveying both religious and secular information.

A peal of bells would be used to announce when the three specific daily prayer times had been reached as well as to summon parishioners to attend the then compulsory Sunday and Saints Day services. There would also be the haunting sound of the Death Knell, which was a muffled tenor bell rung to indicate a death in the village, all too often at a time when mortality, and especially infant mortality, rates were high. It rang in a kind of Morse Code so the hearers could decipher the sex and age of the deceased; they could then identify whose deceased souls they should be praying for. There is also the belief, perhaps rooted in ancient pagan practices, that ringing the bells would drive out evil spirits in the locality. Alfred the Great introduced the curfew bell, as did Churchill in the Second World War, so that their ringing could be reserved to warn of an enemy invasion. On a more cheerful note it would be nice to think that the Bigbury Bells were rung in full glory to celebrate

the Armada's defeat in 1588 as well as for weddings and christenings.

Adding the 6th bell in 1879

In 1872 there was substantial restoration of the church itself at a massive cost of over £1,570. Even so, there was enough money to remove the bell hangings in the roof six years later in 1878, ninety years after the installation of the original 5 bells, the new sixth bell was cast by Warners foundry and installed by Hiram Hambling. This enabled a sixth bell, a new treble, to be added, cast and installed by Mr Hiram Hambling, a local iron founder from Dodbroke whose foundry was in Duke Street in Kingsbridge. He had originally worked with his father in the family foundry in Blackawton, but hanging bells was only a secondary consideration for him as his main occupation was as a gunsmith and dealer in ammunition. The additional bell cost £40 to install, the sum being met by subscriptions.

Initial repairs 1908

In May 1908 these 6 bells were still perfect in sound when they were inspected by the workmen of **Aggetts of Chagford**. Unfortunately the supporting oak beams and the frames were decayed by rain seeping in to the Tower, so they were deemed unsafe. T his had become apparent early on 19th April when the bell ringers had arrived in time to usher in Easter Day. They had hardly started ringing when there was an unnerving noise as the Tenor bell's clapper broke off and fell to the floor. The **PCC immediately halted all ringing**

and agreed to proceed with the repairs and re-hanging at the cost of £130 (over £15,000 in today's currency).

A fund-raising programme was launched and the whole sum and more was collected in just three months, the **Rector's Bell Fund Garden Fete** alone accounted for a third of that income. He singled out three parishioners who made this possible and no-one was more important than Miss Gillard who dressed up as a gypsy and told fortunes all day. Her formula was simple – everybody was predicted a happy future!

Aggetts recommended rehanging the bells in cast iron frames of a modern design incorporating their renowned patented ball bearings. This meant removing the two bells from the top of the Tower and placing three in each of the two chambers below – one set swinging east-west, the other set north-south. The idea of the arrangement was to enable easier bellringing and to create a counterbalance of the weight in the Tower.

At the same time the base of the Steeple was repaired with stone set in cement to prevent the rain seeping in. The bells were repaired by September in time for their re-dedication at the Harvest Festival. The Rural Dean preached a very relevant sermon saying our spiritual parish life should be like bells- in perfect harmony. The church was full, the helpers had decorated it prettily and the service was "of a very hearty character". The joyfulness carried on after the service as Mr Wroth had offered Bigbury Court barn for tea, sports and then dancing, which lasted until midnight.

Our bell ringers were aided by ringers from Aveton Gifford and Modbury at the Harvest Festival but before long bell ringers from all over South Devon had visited the belfry and commented on the smooth and easy manner in which the bells now rung. Sadly the repairs only lasted a couple of generations. Some repairs were needed in the early 1950s as water was seeping in and the frame was tilting. The wooden frames were replaced by steel girders and the top 12 feet of the spire rebuilt with new stone, both at a cost of just under £800.

There was obviously no apparent problem in April 1959 when St Lawrence hosted the **Inter-Deanery Festival**, won by West Alvington, after a full day of ringing. However, by January 1960 the priest in charge during an Interregnum reported that the Bells had to be quickly put in order. This suggestion was based on the report given by the Founders, **Taylors of Loughborough**, the very same foundry that had cast and installed the 12 bells of **St Paul's Cathedral** - only the very best for Bigbury!



The **PCC** quickly approved and set about raising the sum of £1300 required by **Taylors**, initially sending letters to every household in the parish. By June £950 had been raised, boosted by a £500 donation from one of the churchwardens, so the work of reconditioning the bells and repairing the alignment of the framework in the tower could begin. The new Vicar, the **Reverend Davies**, reported in the New Year that the bells were back in the Tower and ringing nicely and that the chamber had new flooring.

Rededication in 1961

On Saturday 28th January 1961 the Bigbury Bells were rededicated again, this time by the **Bishop of Plymouth**. The service started with the customary processional hymn, Psalm and prayer and after the lesson, read by Major Whiston, the Bishop went in procession to the ringing chamber where the bell ropes were presented to him to be dedicated. After his address, in which he praised parish for raising the sum so quickly, the service concluded with the singing of the Ringers' Hymn. Despite the howling gale outside the church was full, the congregation being augmented by dignitaries from the Deanery and by the 80 bell ringers from the 13 different villages who had come to support and to mark the occasion by a competition after the service. Plymstock on this occasion piped both teams from West Alvington.

Competition ringing was very strong at that time for nearly every Saturday from April to November there was a competition somewhere in Devon. Bigbury, as host, was not allowed to compete but the **South Devon Times** records that our bell ringers, newly captained by Mr **Harry Bardens** (following his father's footsteps), had already shown their skill during the service

Our bell ringers had a reputation in the 1950s and to keep it they had been forced to practice in other churches over the previous six months. It was a memorable day in the history of the church and the Vicar reported in the Deanery Magazine "it went with a swing!". He reminded Bigbury, however, that the bells are not just provided for the pleasure of the listeners, they are call to everyone to come to worship God, and he exhorted people to hear and obey the call!

It is again sad to report that these repairs have only lasted a couple of generations as well and the calling to worship ceased around 15 years ago, medieval buildings need proper maintenance. So hopefully the present Fund Raising efforts will be supported as generously and as promptly as the previous ones in order for there to be another memorable day in St Lawrence's history.

ST LAWRENCE MATTERS REPORT

Just when we had established Covid compliant communions, another lockdown comes along, and we are back to online collective worship. We did, however, consider it important to hold a pared back wreath laying ceremony at the war memorial in the churchyard on Remembrance Sunday. Wreaths were laid on behalf of the Royal British Legion, the Parish Council, and the church.

The day before the new lockdown we were able to fit in the visit of the Church Architect. She came to conduct the Quinquennial (5 yearly) Inspection of the fabric of the church. Apart from being a statutory requirement, it will back up our requests for funds to carry out the spire, tower and bells work. We have also recently had an electrical inspection as required by

regulations. Both these inspections are necessary but, like everything else, have to be paid for.

You will have received in last month's Bigbury News a questionnaire canvassing your opinions on the church. Please take the time to fill it in. If we are to get Lottery money, we need to convince them that the church will be supported by the wider community. We know there is a lot of support for our efforts – the production and raffle of the quilt is a magnificent demonstration (see the separate report) – but your views will shape our efforts and are essential. 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





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AVIAN FLU PREVENTION ZONE

An Avian Influenza Prevention Zone

(AIPZ) was declared on 11th November across the whole of England to mitigate the risk of the disease spreading

It is now a legal requirement for all bird keepers to follow strict bio-security measures. Keepers with more than 500 birds will need to restrict access for nonessential people on their sites, workers will need to change clothing and footwear before entering bird enclosures and site vehicles will need to be cleaned and disinfected regularly.


Backyard owners with smaller numbers of poultry including chickens, ducks and geese are urged to strengthen their bio-security measures in order to prevent further outbreaks of avian influenza in the UK. It is in your interests to do this to protect your birds from this highly infectious disease.

Public Health England (PHE) advises that the risk to public health from the virus is very low and the Food Standards Agency advises that avian influenzas pose a very low food safety risk for UK consumers. Properly cooked poultry and poultry products, including eggs, are safe to eat.

Apart from two outbreaks in commercial bird rearing facilities, a very small number of wild birds in the South West of England have also been found to have had the disease. The introduction of a prevention zone follows a decision to raise the risk level for avian influenza incursion in wild Birds in Great Britain from 'medium' to 'high' last week.

What must be done?

The prevention zone means bird keepers across the country must:



- Feed and water your birds in enclosed areas to discourage wild birds;
- Minimise movement in and out of bird enclosures;
- Clean and disinfect footwear and keep areas where birds live clean and tidy;
- Reduce any existing contamination by cleansing and disinfecting concrete areas, and fencing off wet or boggy areas.
- The prevention zone will be in place until further notice and will be kept under regular review as part of our work to monitor the threat of bird flu.

Poultry keepers and members of the public should report dead wild birds to the Defra helpline on 03459 33 55 77 and keepers should report suspicion of disease to APHA on 03000 200 301. Keepers should familiarise themselves with our avian flu advice

Avian Influenza is in no way connected to the COVID-19 pandemic which is caused by the SARS-CoV-2 virus which is not carried in poultry.


SUB EDITOR NEEDED

So - we did OK in 2020 between us all. Let's keep it up two, three, four! **Louise Wainwright**








GARDENING WITH DONKEYS!

Our donkeys are Jack aged 9 and Frankie aged 10. They were both rescued from cruelty and neglect by the wonderful team at the **Donkey Sanctuary UK** and now live with us in Devon. There is much misunderstanding about donkeys – they are not stubborn but stoic in nature with a strong sense of self preservation. Our donkeys are affectionate, intelligent, curious, playful and charismatic. They very much have their own personalities – for Jack think 'Eeyore' and Frankie 'donkey' from the film Shrek.

Donkeys are not small horses with large ears and the two animals need very different types of care. Enrichment is important for all animals and rather than sitting in a rather boring paddock Jack and Frankie live in a wood which encourages more natural behaviour and provides mental stimulation – and lets them chase squirrels and pheasants.

Donkeys are twice as strong as a similar sized horse. They are the perfectly designed all-terrain vehicle. This was recognised by the Romans who first brought them to England in AD43. For nearly two thousand years they have been used as riding, pack and draught animals throughout Britain. During World War One 80,000 donkeys were used to transport wounded soldiers to the field hospitals of Northern France.

There are 42 million working donkeys worldwide - these incredibly hardworking animals support the livelihood of impoverished peoples everywhere. Many individuals thrive or survive thanks to their donkey companions. Donkeys in developing countries often have poor welfare standards, more often through lack of caring skills rather than neglect. The Donkey Sanctuary is now an international welfare organisation, working in 35 countries, educating and training local vets and developing community programmes with owners and farriers. It is a truly global programme having a lasting impact on the welfare of working donkeys and their owners

Closer to home Ivybridge is one of several **Donkey Sanctuary** facilities which have now become world leaders in **Donkey Assisted Therapy**. Donkeys have an emotional intelligence that enables them to be trained to help vulnerable adults and children. Adults with mental health issues can be helped to develop life skills such as self-esteem, empathy and understanding emotions. Vulnerable children can improve emotional connections, social interactions, communication skills and self-confidence.

The donkeys at Ivybridge are carefully



selected to be gentle, calm and well behaved so that of course rules out Jack and Frankie who were sent to us instead.

They both wake up every morning thinking "What can I eat today?" Both donkeys love eating carrots, apples, pears, ginger nut biscuits and unfortunately.... roses, honeysuckle, jasmine and anything growing in a raised vegetable bed...but that's Gardening With Donkeys.


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LETTERS from AMERICA

Earlier this year we saw the restored Mayflower II leaving Mystic for Plymouth, Massachusetts. Seeing the replica of the Mayflower that transported the Pilgrims 400 years ago prompted me to write a piece last month about their crossing. This is what happened next...

In the final days of the voyage, an agreement establishing legal order; the Mayflower Compact; was signed by all male passengers. So it was that the Plymouth Colony was the first Western self-government between individuals, and not with a monarch. To survive, the colony depended on the consent of each other.

Having endured two harsh weeks on Cape Cod, an expedition was launched to find a suitable settlement site. The 34 people in the open rowing boat were forced to spend the night ashore in sub-zero temperatures, and their inappropriate clothing, wet shoes and stockings froze overnight. It was later recorded that, "Some of our people that are now dead, took the origin of their death here".

Having located a site, the frozen ground made it impossible to do any planting. Nor were they prepared for the snow storms that made the countryside impassable without snowshoes. During the depth of that first winter, the passengers remained on the Mayflower, suffering outbreaks of contagious diseases; scurvy, pneumonia, and tuberculosis; and by the spring, half had died. With 53 Pilgrims and crew remaining, huts were built ashore, and the passengers disembarked on March 21, 1621. After unloading four of its artillery pieces to help fortify the colony, the Mayflower set sail for England on April 5 with its decimated crew.

Later that month the governor and his wife died, and William Bradford was unanimously chosen as the new Governor. He would be re-elected 30 times and serve for all but five years until 1656.

The tribes of the region around Plymouth Colony were of the Wampanoag people. Soon after the Pilgrims built their settlement, they came into contact with Squanto, an English-speaking native. Squanto was a member of the Pawtuxet tribe (from present-day Massachusetts and Rhode Island) who had been seized by an English explorer in 1614. Meant for slavery, he had managed to escape to England, and had returned to find most of his tribe dead from the plague. Squanto mediated between the Pilgrims and local chiefs, he also taught the newcomers how to plant corn, which became an important crop, as well as where to fish and hunt. In the fall of 1621, the Pilgrims famously

shared a harvest feast with local natives; which is now considered the basis for the first Thanksgiving holiday.

Unlike a modern Thanksgiving, this dinner would not have included turkey or mashed potatoes (potatoes were just making their way from South America to Europe), but the Wampanoag brought deer and seafood plus the fruits of the first pilgrim harvest, including pumpkin, would have resulted in quite a feast.


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Dear Fellow Coasters,

Concerned Resident from Folly Hill

Following a recent incident in Bigbury-on-Sea, a resident has asked Bigbury News to politely remind all residents that they should either keep their dogs on a lead when walking them or keep an eye on them at all times in case they poo without you noticing. It is just as bad to 'flick it with a stick" into the grass verge as people who need to strim the grass verge have experienced being splattered with dog poo as a result of someone not picking up.

It might be of interest to read what **South Hams District Council** website says on the topic. "Under the Anti-Social Behaviour Crime and Policing Act 2014 **Public Spaces Protection Order 2017; Control of Dogs,** the person in charge of a dog whether they are the owner or not, must clean up after the dog has fouled in any area that the Act applies to. It is an offence not to clean up after your dog, punishable by a **maximum fine of £1000 or a fixed penalty of £100**". Residents with specific concerns are able to report this to SHDC on their website. **www.southhams.gov.uk/article/4111/Dog-Fouling** SHDC undertook a **public consultation** during 2020 and wil be reporting soon on whether it will become an **offence in South Hams to take a dog for a walk without a poo bag.**



Sea buckthorn (*Hippophae rhamnoides*) has been widely planted along the banks surrounding the Bigbury-on-Sea car park. It is in the same family as *Elaeagnus*, which is also widely grown in gardens at Bigbury-on-Sea. Both these plants are tolerant of salt and windy conditions. Sea buckthorn is widely used in Europe for conservation plantings as it is a native plant and tolerant to drought conditions. It does not grow well in boggy areas.

At this time of year sea buckthorn boasts tart, orange berries with a citrusy note. These berries have a high in nutrient value and are even grown commercially to produce the raw ingredients for health care products.

RNLI lifeguards issued a warning after a child was injured by a poisonous Portuguese Man o' War jellyfish on a Bantham beach. Their warning followed a 'painful incident' involving a child picking one up in a rock pool.

A spokesman said: "We're advising people to avoid them, particularly their blue tendrils which can inflict some excruciating pain when touched." The creatures are found in warm waters, and live on the surface, being moved by winds, currents and tides. Often, finding a single jellyfish is followed by finding many others in the vicinity. Their stings can kill small fish and other prey. In humans the pain is extreme, but is said to subside in most cases in one to three hours.






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

5.0 County Councillor's report On Tuesday 3rd November Adam Keay and myself met with Bigbury & Ringmore PC's at Challaborough. We discussed various parking and trailer delivery issues. I believe the meeting went well and lead to a better understanding and to a way forward in improving matters.

6.0 Challaborough Yellow lining and **Parking Matters**

A member of the public from Challaborough summarised the issues that were discussed at a site 1 meeting on Tuesday Nov.3rd at Challaborough with Cllr Gilbert and Adam Keay, residents of Challaborough, Ringmore and BPC members. VS explained the matter of faded yellow lines leading to uncontrolled parking in turn creating severe traffic flow and congestion problems can be dealt with in two stages. The first will be to reinstate the yellow lining as per the existing RTO, while the second will be to extend the lining through new RTOs, which will take 12 months or so to pass through due process before they become lawful. Cllr Gilbert emphasised that action on parking controls and yellow lining can take place only as permitted by prevailing law. VS proposed and EH seconded the immediate reinstatement of yellow lines that can be achieved now via existing RTOs. SW, KH, GR, SS supported and CC abstained.

Discussion on precise proposals for the second stage was deferred to a following BPC meeting.

7.0 District Councillor's report

Half a million pounds has been made available for home insulation 350k from central government and 150k from SHDC climate emergency fund. These would help cut carbon emissions. The fund will be available for people with incomes less than 30k per annum, 10k max per household for external, cavity wall and loft insulation. Grants of £1000 for small business and £1500 for larger business the details are on SHDC web site also mortgage holidays to be extended,

Car parks are to stay open in this lock down but no free parking and all toilets will remain open.,

All leisure centres are closed but the pools will remain heated,

Parishes are encouraged to maintain community help groups but demand is expected to be much lower this time around.

8.0 Finance – payments to be made and approval of financial statements SS proposed that the following payments be approved. This was seconded by VS and agreed unanimously by EH,CC,SW.KH.

The cash book has been updated to October 31st for uploading onto Bigbury Community Website upon BPC approval. Cash book and bank statements have been reconciled @ £43,146.78 and the working surplus stands at £28,147.02

SS proposed acceptance of the above, VS seconded and agreed unanimously by EH,CC,SW.KH.

9.0 Planning related matters 2069/20/HHO, 'Seaspray', Warren Road, Bigbury On Sea, TO7 4AZ. VS advised that Neighbourhood Plan

Committee had met and discussed these revised plans for this development and expressed numerous significant concerns about them. VS appraised BPC of all these concerns which centred around the scale and massing of the new development arising from the proposed highly glazed, 2 storey, gabled extension and increase in ridge height of the property to extend, unbroken for the full length of the new roof and the inclusion of a balcony at a first floor window; the inadequacy of privacy screening at too short a height to be effective; the consequent overlooking and loss of privacy to neighbouring properties arising from the above; the scope for light pollution from the extensive glazing; parking provision which was felt to be inadequate for the likely level of occupancy of the property for which holiday letting takes place; a high possibility of noise disturbance, given possible levels of occupancy, all these adversely affecting the amenities of neighbouring properties.

The above issues were considered to be in conflict with BNP policies; BP7 General

VS proposed refusal but that should SHDC be minded to approve, it should be subject to no external lighting be permitted and that Permitted Development rights should be withdrawn. GR seconded, EH, SW and SS supported and CC and KH abstained.

CC commented that the growing of herbs in itself was not a problem and that as there was time to gather more information before the next BPC meeting on December 9th and submit a response before the consultation deadline we should discuss it at the next meeting on December on 9th, GR seconded this and EH, SW, SS, KH agreed.

10.0 Ringmore Neighbourhood Plan-Regulation 14

VS advised that BPC had no comments and should support this well constructed plan. CC advised that she had not read the plan completely and asked whether this item could be discussed at the next BPC meeting in December to give time for her to form a more fully considered response. IB to add it as an agenda item for then

11.0 Bigbury Neighbourhood Plan Committee

VS asked that the BPC 'Zoom' facility, with longer meeting times possible could be used with IB hosting the facility and taking minutes of the meetings. IB was agreeable to this, within the remit of his function as clerk to BPC. EH proposed approval, GR seconded, SW,SS,CC,VS,KH agreed.

12.0 Lockdown

SW advised the **Covid Voluntary Support** network was still in place to be called upon if necessary.

13.0 Skip Hire

IB confirmed that the proposed skip could still be delivered during lockdown but a

councillor suggested leaving it until after Christmas and at the December meeting decide a date for it to be sited in St Ann's Chapel in early February. This was agreed by EH, GR, SW, SS, CC, KH.

14.0 Sedgewell Slipway.

IB reported 2 quotes had now been obtained for £650 and £675 fow for the white lining of parking spaces in the layby at the head of the slipway. SS proposed approval for the work to proceed with lower of the two quotes, from a firm recommended by SHDC. GR seconded, SW and CC supported, KH did not support and VS and EH abstained. The work therefore was approved and IB will obtain dates for the work to be done.

15.0 Open session.

A member of the public advised BPC that a **new church architect** was now actively working towards starting the proposed alterations and **work to the church** gateway during 2021 and asked that BPC be mindful of this in discussions of the precept for 2021/22 and that BPC had previously **committed to a contribution of** £5,000 from parish funds . SW reminded councillors that this amount had been earmarked for this project and remained so. The total cost of the work was anticipated to be between £10K - £15k.

16.0 Correspondence Received

IB reported that email correspondence and bulletins had been forwarded to councillors for their information but referred specifically to correspondence from **PKF Littlejohn**, BPC external auditors and that action agreed with them to display parish accounts publicly on the parish website and noticeboards had been taken. Correspondence had been received from **Bugford Nurseries** in Dartmouth ref Christmas trees now available should the parish wish to purchase one.

17.0 Any other business.

IB advised that a **Zoom meeting** had been booked for Thursday December 3rd at 10:00 am. to discuss the parish precept for 2021/22.

EH advised of latest news from The Bay View Café;

In lockdown the community cafe at Bigbury on Sea is delivering up to 3 course evening meals on a Friday from 5.30pm & baking hand made croissants, Danish pastries, buns & tea cakes every Sunday morning. This runs alongside their lockdown, masked take-away tea/coffee/soup & cakes. They are also showcasing the work of local artists. There will be a Christmas Fayre with local produce for sale early in December.

Carols on the Screen this year.

CC advised she had contacted the Rogers family to advise them of ideas to do work to the playing field and play park. She had also asked the Memorial Hall if they would consider a contribution to the work'.

SS reported a moving Remembrance
Day Service and the laying of the Parish
Wreath.

CONNECTIVITY IN BIGBURY - Update Dec 2020

After lengthy discussions with local Internet Service Providers* (ISP) and Matt Barrow from Connecting Devon & Somerset (CDS) the following guide has been jointly prepared to inform Parishioners in Bigbury of the various options available now or before Q2 2021 for internet connectivity and possible delivery timetables. CDS is funded by HM Government to appoint Contractors to optimise a 30 MB outreach (superfast broadband) into rural areas between 2021 and 2024. This is a highly competitive industry and all packages are likely to be competitively priced and gigabit capable. D.Cllr. Rufus Gilbert is on the Board of CDS and reports each month to Bigbury Parish Council on many matters, including Connectivity.

Households are allowed two aerials mounted on their properties without the need for planning permission. There is unlikely to be any further Fibre-To-The Cabinet (FTTC) works, because all the easy connections have been delivered and if you do not have it now it means you are too far away from the existing Cabinets. Technology is moving very fast. The Fibre to the Premises (FTTP) has probably now been superseded by Fixed Wireless Access technology, making it unnecessary to dig up new roads and lay cables under the ground. The Gigaclear network in Bigbury was to provide FTTP technology.

Update on Fibre Optic Cables and PIA

The network laid in our roads by Gigaclear in 2018 are unlikely to be connected by Gigaclear because their contract was terminated by CDS in 2019. It is not generally known whether the ducting has had fibre blown through it or whether it is actually connected to a cabinet. The underground network in the ground still belongs to Gigaclear because they were not paid by CDS for this work. It therefore remains a possibility that when it is known which households will not be in Phase 1 for the New CDS Contractor (Option 2 below) - Gigaclear may still pick up outlying residences where they already have Gigaclear ducting in the road. The underground Gigaclear network is unlikely to be used by the, yet to be announced, new CDS Contractor because all ISPs are now allowed to use the existing Open Reach BT ducts under the roads and telegraph poles to create a' Spine' from which they can connect homes to the internet. This is called Passive Infrastructure Access (PIA). It supersedes the 'old' system which requires roads to be dug up and fibre optic cables put down ducts buried in the road. The PIA will

still require some roadworks but they will be less intrusive than the full excavations required in 2018 for the 'old' fibre optic cable system.

The new Contractor for CDS will be announced by CDS in January 2021. The New Contractor will announce by the end of February 2021, which homes in Bigbury Parish, if any*, will be in the first phase of the CDS contract. There may be a 'second phase' once the overall 'Connectivity Spine' has been installed in Bigbury Parish and all the first phase residences are connected. More details of the possible timetable for Bigbury Parish will be revealed by Feb 2021. The new CDS Contractor probably has to complete all their works in their Lot F before the end of 2024 before they receive any funding from CDS. The earliest any works by the new CDS Contractor might begin is likely to be the third quarter of 2021. We will not know until Feb/March 2021 when Bigbury Parish will be put into the timetable. This very unlikely.

What are the Options?

Depending on where you live, only certain options will be available to you and some sooner than others. If you are prepared to pay for two connection charges, you might consider taking up an interim contract with one ISP whilst you wait for the New CDS Contractor to commence works in Bigbury Parish. Contract times vary – so check the Options below. CDS assures Readers that if they chose to sign an 'interim' contract - this will NOT affect the contractual obligations of the new CDS Contractor to develop an extensive Internet Spine within Bigbury Parish and offer packages at normal industry charges. However, if you are happy with the service of the 'interim' ISP - there would seem no need to move to a different ISP and incurring another installation fee. Please note that the contract terms for local ISPs range from 12 to 36 months (see Options below).

Internet signals need to come from transmitter aerials within Line of Sight (LOS) of the receiver at your home so not all residences will benefit equally from all Options below due to the topography of the parish. This is a very competitive business and most packages will be broadly the same monthly cost. Your real choice will depend on your location and how long you are prepared to wait because lead times vary.

STEP 1. Identify your location from the Areas described below.

Area 1: Bigbury-on-Sea & Challaborough within Line of Sight with Burgh Island – *Option 1, Option 2, Option 3, and Option 6*

Area 2: St Ann's Chapel & areas within Line of Sight of Bigbury Golf Club – *Option 1, Option 2, Option 4, Option 6*

Area 3: Not in Line of Sight of Bigbury Golf Club or St Ann's Chapel and in deep valleys – *Option 1, Option 2, Option 5, Option 6 and Option 7*

STEP 2. Review the Options below and contact one or more of the relevant ISPs to register an interest and arrange a survey/ quotation.

Option 1: Bush Broadband: As a registered supplier with Building Digital UK (BDUK), Bush Broadband has a new project called RadioFibre and has submitted a project to BDUK's Gigabit Broadband Voucher Scheme under the Rural Gigabit Connectivity program. Bush expect confirmation within the next week or so that their proposal has been accepted. They hope to offer a Gigabit capable service using a combination of advanced technology Terragraph radios and full fibre connections for Bigbury-on-Sea. Residents are eligible for free installation of this future-proofed system under the Gigabit Broadband Voucher Scheme, with available speeds ranging from 30Mbps up to 1Gbps and prices starting from as low as £40 + vat per month. Existing Bush Broadband subscribers in Bigbury-on-Sea are also eligible for a free upgrade to their service under the scheme.

For South Hams residents not residing in Bigbury-on-Sea the Radio Wave service is available, which is a Fixed Wireless Access solution offering speeds between 10Mbps to 30Mbps. However, this is not subsidised and the installation fee is £350 + vat. Contracts for all services are only 12 months, including their VoIP telephone service called Fone. Local IT technologist, Phil Shea, is now also undertaking works for Bush in Bigbury Parish. Visit www.radiofIbre.com for further information and to register your interest.

Option 2: By Jan/Feb 2021 the successful New Contractor for the Connecting Devon & Somerset Tender should have confirmed which residences in Bigbury Parish will be connected in the initial phase of their programme and the anticipated timetable for these works (at any time between 2021 and 2024) Monthly Packages have not been published yet because the New Contractor has not yet been appointed. The New CDS Contractor has contractual obligations to offer residential packages as near as possible to industry norm prices and must have completed all works in Lot F (broadly

this is the South Hams) by end 2024 - or they do not get paid. It is worth waiting until the scope and timetable is reported by CDS in Jan/Feb 2021 before committing to a new contract with another ISP or any significant capital investment to build an alternative system. If the timetable and areas covered by the New CDS Contractor do not meet the needs of some residents there are different options available depending on your location and ability to wait.

Option 3: The Internet Service Provider on Burgh Island is finalising arrangements so that they are able to offer their awardwinning Airwave (Fixed Wireless Access) packages to residents in Bigbury-on-Sea and Challaborough from the first quarter of 2021. If you are in Line of Sight of buildings on Burgh Island, you may benefit. Installation fees can be covered by a BDUK voucher with a free upgrade to full fibre once available in the area. The packages offered start with a basic 30Mb to a family orientated 50Mb download (a VoIP phone can be added for £5.99). Contract period will be 24 months. This will require a very discrete aerial to be mounted on the customer's property. If a minimum of 15 households register an interest, they will commence investments as soon as possible and hope to have at least 50 residences sign up by the end of 2021 to make it viable. VOIP Unlimited is registered supplier with Building Digital UK (BDUK), and a Tier 2 ISP. This island is currently serviced by a Gigabit capable connection. VoIP Unlimited is based in Dorset www. voip-unlimited.net 01202 612000.

Option 4: Local ISP, Skylight Broadband, has already set up a network capable of delivering packages from £24 to £50 per month to many households in Bigbury Parish but not into deep valleys or at Bigbury-on-Sea or Challaborough because of the topography. SkyLight offer download speeds of 24 to 45 MB and uploads speeds of 2 to 10 MB. Costs vary from: £80 to £150. VOIP phone lines can be added for £2.50 per month. This is a Fixed Wireless Access system which relies on signals from transmitters within Line of Sight of the Receivers at the customers' premises. There is a map on the SkyLight website showing which areas are already able to receive a signal. Broadly speaking your house would need to be in Line of Sight of Bigbury Golf Club or the Pickwick Inn to benefit. www.skylightbroadband.com

Option 5: Wait until the CDS Contractor has installed their Phase 1 'Spine' into Bigbury Parish (between 2021 and 2024) and then use your Gigabit Voucher Scheme entitlement to apply for an individual or pooled community network from the New

CDS Contractor. This would probably require several neighbours to also agree to do this and the number of properties needed to make this commercially viable would be calculated by the CDS Contractor. Once agreed, the service must be in place within 12 months – but the 'start date' is likely to depend on the completion of Phase 1 elsewhere in the parish.

Option 6. If you get a reasonable mobile signal at your home you may be able to use a mobile phone network to link into a 4G internet capable network. Contact local IT Consultant Phil Shea to assess whether it is possible to install an Amplified Aerial pick up of a 4G mobile phone signal to deliver internet services to your home. Phil can test which provider gives you the most reliable mobile signal. This system has been very successful in several parts of the parish and proved capable of delivering 50 MBs downloads and 20 MBs upload speeds. You may be able to optimise your reception by moving your router more within the Line of Sight of the nearest phone signal transmitter and raising your aerial on a pole above your roof. Option 7: If you have a Gigaclear cable in your road - contact Gigaclear to ask if they are willing to connect your premises to their system (they are probably only likely to consider this if you were not in the initial CDS Contractors roll out area and you did not get a positive response to Option 5. You may have to wait for any positive feedback, until after everyone else in phase 1 for the new CDS Contractor has been connected and Phase 2 (Option 5) is completed. Then the residual areas will be known.

Gigabit Broadband Voucher Scheme Customers will always ask the ISP for a quote to include the installation fee. Most installation fees detailed in the above options are reasonable fees and competitively priced. However, in extreme locations, if the installation fee is excessive, due to their location (not in Line of Sight of a radio aerial) they may be eligible to apply for a government subsidy. The Gigabit Broadband Voucher Scheme (GBVS) is managed by BDUK under the Department of Culture, Media and Sport. It offers beneficiaries subsidies towards a Gigabit capable system. The scheme has been running for some time and they now only have funds available for projects in rural locations. Devon residents can receive up to £1,500 and SME's (Small to Medium business Enterprises) £3,500 towards the installation costs. Any ISP can apply to BDUK to be allowed to utilise the GBVS to subsidise their installation fees. Only Registered ISP can offer access to this scheme.

If there are several households in a similar predicament they may pool their vouchers and apply together to an ISP which is registered with BDUK to have access to the GBVS. Open Reach and Bush Broadband are both registered suppliers can both offer the GBVS discounted packages. Most ISPs do not require a formal contract and insistence on up-front costs being paid in advance of completion and connection. The "Community Fibre Partnership" is the brand name for the community pooled network scheme offered by Open Reach. Open Reach do not have exclusive rights to this and other ISPs will have a similar scheme but will call it something different.

Universal Service Order (USO) The USO is managed solely by Open Reach (except in Hull) and overseen by Ofcom. Beneficiaries can receive up to £3,400 towards installation costs but according to an independent review* we are yet to see an instance where this has covered the costs of a project, leaving the customer to pay the other £X,XXX to get fast broadband. One resident at Bigburyon-Sea was recently quoted 40,000 to £50,000 to be connected, The USO is as contentious an issue for smaller Internet Service Providers as it is to the thousands of customers being presented with an outrageous quote to get fast broadband installed. This scheme is applicable to individual premises that are not covered by any of the Options described above. However, there may be an updated offer from USO (Open Reach) in the New Year which could allow vouchers to be pooled to contribute to a community style project. It is difficult to communicate with USO because they do not have the facility to email customers, which makes it difficult to record discussions in the same way as it is with other Internet Service Providers. Bigbury is being offered gigabit capable packages (and certainly 10 MBs packages) from local ISP providers who say they can deliver during 2021. This might have an impact on eligibility for the USO – we will have to wait and see.

Essentially, USO offers those who live in an area where download speeds of at least 10Mbps (1Mbps upload) aren't achievable have gained the "legal right" to "request" a 10Mbps+ capable connection from BT. Meanwhile areas that are due to benefit from a "publicly funded broadband rollout plan within the next 12 months" remain excluded. Beware that it could take 24 months to complete the installation depending on the location even though the scheme is supposed to be in place within 12 months. The CDS scheme (Option 2) is a publically funded Scheme which might complicate the eligibility of Bigbury residents. As you can see from the many local internet options described above - you should be able to achieve 10

CONNECTIVITY

MBs during 2021- so this might also make Bigbury residents not eligible for USO schemes. The USO fee is per individual premise and cannot be cost-shared by several premises. Even if another premise nearby applies for a USO they will also be quoted a similar large sum under the USO Scheme.
