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

#### **Bigbury Play Park**

The play park at St Ann's Chapel behind the Memorial Hall is in a bit of a sorry state. However, Bigbury Parish Council is pleased to report that funding has been secured and a clear timetable for



the complete replacement of the play park equipment has been laid out. By the time you read this update, at least six play park suppliers will have made a site visit and be in the process of preparing their quotations. The timetable for completing the refurbishment is shown below. The specifications given to the suppliers quoting has been deliberately not very prescriptive to encourage imaginative designs, but the two very important criteria required are: all-weather ground surface and equipment that uses a minimal amount of wood, both for obvious reasons.

The budget for the replacement play park is up to £95,000. This funding has mainly come from Section 106 funds. Section 106 of the Town and Country Planning Act 1990 allows South Hams District Council to require a developer (such as those of Holywell Meadow and Chapel Orchard) to fund the delivery of matters that are necessary to make a development acceptable in planning terms such as the provision of improvements in recreational facilities (e.g. the play park).

#### Night-time Noise

Pollution comes in many forms .... from physical litter to smoke, light and noise. The BPC is aware of several instances in which loud parties have gone on into the early hours of the morning.

While we all appreciate a party, it should not be at the expense of others. Late night noise has the affect of disturbing and interfering with the right of others to enjoy their evening as they wish. The natural peacefulness of the area means excessive noise penetrates widely and disproportionately.

Interesting, the permitted level of noise between the hours of 11pm-7am is only 34 decibels (the equivalent of a quiet whisper).

We simply ask that everyone please be sensitive to and respectful of the right of others to have a quiet night. And, if you loan or rent your home out to others, please ask them to comply.

In addition to Harry and Ellen, we had seven other Bardens including four grandchildren present.



The Devon Association of Ringers (DAR) also turned out in force and treated us to some stunning bell ringing. They made the bells positively sing.

Ian Avery, President of DAR, reminisced about the times both he and his father Bill had shared in many a bell tower with Harry and Ellen. He thanked them for their contribution to DAR over the last six decades. Harry has been the Bell Captain at Bigbury for the last 67 years. Now that must be a record of some sort?

To celebrate their contribution, a plaque was erected in the ringing chamber of the church in appreciation of Harry and Ellen's service to bell ringing and the church. Jill Gubbins and Angie Carson led the way in coordinating refreshments that were prepared by many. Jan Davies' book on *"The Bardens of Bigbury"* was freely available during the afternoon. It gave a real insight into the breadth and depth of the contributions the Bardens have made to the fabric of Bigbury life over the last four hundred years.

The Bardens have run pubs, a shop, the post office, the garage and the famous Bardens Tea Shop as well as fishing the waters of Bigbury Bay.

Visitors were also encouraged to write memories and messages to the Bardens in the memories book.

A very enjoyable afternoon was had by all.



























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St Lawrence Matters

#### **CHURCH NEWS**

With the temporary interruption of the publication of the B&R News due to a change of editor – welcome Jennie! - there is some catching up on St Lawrence's news to do!

Unexpected news came from vicar Matt Rowland at the start of December - he will be leaving his post in the Modbury Mission at the end of April to become vicar of St Leonard's, Exeter. He explained this was an unplanned move after seven years here, but the post offers the opportunity to return to his first church where he started clerical life. His family will follow him to Exeter at the end of the school year. Our curate Oli Long will continue in his role as expected till at least January 2026, supported by Joyce Howitt and Gil Snook, and overseen by Archdeacon of Totnes, Douglas Dettmer. Under Church of England's procedures, the Mission PCCs can not seek a replacement vicar until Matt has officially left, but thought is being given to the qualities sought in a new vicar. We are hopeful our five churches will prove attractive for incoming clergy watch this space! Matt's last service at St Lawrence will be on Palm Sunday, 13th April.

All welcome at a farewell event in St George's, Modbury, 3pm **Sunday 27th April**. Although obviously sorry to see Matt leave, all good wishes for the future will accompany him.

A second 'out of the blue' announcement came mid-February, with the news of Harry and Ellen Bardens' move from Bigbury to be closer to family in Bristol. The Bardens have been part of Bigbury's history and community since at least the 1700s – see the books Bigbury Past & Present and The Bells of St Lawrence for further background\* so their departure truly is the end of an era. Elsewhere in this News is a report of an event held on 15th March at St Lawrence to celebrate the roles Harry and Ellen have both played in Bigbury and Devon bellringing over many years. Harry was also churchwarden from 1962 to 1989. St Lawrence will miss Ellen and Harry hugely and our love goes with them.

On more general matters – December's community coffee morning raised £758 for St Lawrence and was a busy and convivial event. Well done to Jean, Yvonne and the other





stall holders for their hard work, not only in December but over the year raising funds (a record £4,128 in 2024) for many local charities! All the Christmas services were very well and joyfully attended, and thank you to all who decorated the church beautifully. Also, after various painting jobs were finished and windows cleaned, the interior

scaffolding at the rear of the church was removed the week before Christmas, making entry into the church easier and allowing use of the rear pews again – hurray!

A Mothering Sunday service will have been held on 30th March, a lovely chance to acknowledge our appreciation of mums!

Whilst the temporary organ gifted from Sandra Inglis is doing sterling service accompanying our singing, behind the scenes the search continues for a permanent replacement. On the building works front, improvements to the electrics are planned before refurbishing the vestry, and final works in the tower are due in April. Plus repairs to the floor tiles are being funded by the Friends of St Lawrence (FoSL), for which many grateful thanks! St Lawrence Church has seen much volunteer effort put into it since 2019 in the spirit of protecting our parish's religious and historical centre. Whether you wish to join in a service, (see the Mission calendar elsewhere in the News for Easter services), visit for private prayer, discover the community history or appreciate the architecture, you are most warmly

welcome at St Lawrence.

All good wishes for Easter –do come along to the Easter Saturday Fair on **19th April** at Bigbury Memorial Hall, refreshments, stalls and a Spring themed wreath workshop await you, in aid of the church, and then celebrate Holy Communion on Easter Day with Oli Long!





If you apply for a postal vote, please bear in mind that postal ballots will be sent out on Wednesday 16 April. However, if you apply after 24 March your postal vote may not be posted until 22 April. If you are concerned that you will be away when your postal ballot is delivered you may wish to appoint a proxy instead. A proxy is a person you appoint to vote on your behalf.

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#### **BEAVERS ARE COMING HOME!**

The Wildlife Trusts congratulate the UK Government's decision to open the door for licenced reintroductions of beavers into the wild and its acknowledgment of the free-living populations in several parts of England.

The Government have recently announced that applications to return beavers into river catchments in England will be accepted. This paves the way for this native species to roam wild in British rivers and lakes once more, helping to create wetlands and increase biodiversity. Natural England has developed a detailed licencing regime and application process to make sure that stakeholders are engaged and landowners are supported.




#### **BluePrint Project**

The cherry on the cake at the Island Assembly, was the breaking news from Avon River Champions, that the application to the Water Restoration Fund had been successful and that the BluePrint Project has been awarded £138,000. Funding for this 18-month programme came from the £2.1 million fine imposed on South West Water for pollution caused by inadequate capacity at their sewage treatment works in 2023.

There was fierce competition for this relatively small pot of money from across the SWW region. The BluePrint Project was developed collaboratively by Avon River Champions, SeaDream Education CIO, Friends of Salcombe Kingsbridge Estuary, Sustainable Blackawton, Force4Nature and Plymouth Marine Laboratory. The funding will be used to design three catchment plans for the River Avon, River Gara & Slapton Ley and the Salcombe Kingsbridge Estuary.

The design of the catchment plans will involve all stakeholders - farmers. businesses. parish and district councils. households, community groups and environmental organisations. The BluePrint Project will culminate in a **River Summit this** autumn when farmers and other stakeholders will be invited to be



partners in the follow up 'Delivery Project' which will fund the capital costs of implementing the agreed interventions. The ambitious aim is to agree a co-designed plan to restore the health of our local rivers and estuaries to 'Good Ecological Status' by 2027.

If the first phase (BluePrint Project) is successful, we will be in a strong position to bid for follow on funding from the Water Restoration Fund for the Delivery Project – from £500,000 to £2 million.

#### **River Water Quality Groups**

The local framework for action to improve water quality in our rivers and tributaries is a River Water Quality Group. Already set up to serve the River Yealm and the River Erme, the RWQG consists of a representative from each of the neighbouring parish councils in our river valley from the source up on Dartmoor to Bigbury Bay.

Avon River Champions will be presenting this proposal to Bigbury Parish Council at their Annual Parish Meeting in the Memorial Hall on **9 April.**

#### **Island Assembly**

Burgh Island was once more the iconic meeting place for a high-level summit focussing on "Clean Rivers - Clean Seas." Giles Fuchs and Niki Fuchs sponsored the Island Assembly on the 13th March which brought together leaders from across Devon to focus on the practical and immediate actions which could be taken to reduce pollution from all sources. Organised jointly by Avon River Champions and Bigbury Net Zero, the assembly brought together 56 leaders from all sectors - parish, district and Devon County councillors, Caroline Voaden MP, environmental organisations, scientists, community groups, businesses and farmers. Delegates heard from inspirational and informed speakers who outlined the issues and solutions.

#### Renewable Energy feasibility

We were one of only two community groups in the National Grid Electricity Distributions region to be selected to participate in the REACH Project funded by Ofgem. This is a desk-based research project to explore innovative ways to support rural communities in constrained electricity network areas to achieve their de-carbonisation ambitions. If we are successful in progressing to the next stage, more details will follow.

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

As usual this will be at Malborough Village Hall T 10am.







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
