

ST ANN'S PLAYPARK

The Parish Council over the last few months has been working hard to finalise the play park plans for St Ann's Chapel play park.



A sub-committee of the parish council was established (Cathy Case, David Molesworth, Kara Latham Sanders, Ian Bramble and Henry Wainwright) and requests for quotations (RFQs) were dispatched to leading play companies. Eight designs with quotations were received and three shortlisted designs were put out for public consultation.

At a public meeting comments and ideas were exchanged. The consensus was that Dragon Play and Sports Ltd design and quotation was the most attractive and competitive and this was subsequently endorsed by the full Parish Council.

Since then the sub-committee has been working with Dragon Play to refine the design and this has now been finalised. The final design along with numerous supporting documentation have been submitted to the Senior Green Spaces and Recreation Officer for South Hams District Council with our application for Section106 (s106) funds (as part of the Town and Country Planning Act 1990) has been confirmed.

On July 10th, Ian Bramble (Bigbury Parish Clerk) signed the order for the play park construction, so it is now full steam ahead.

The completion date of 1 October is still our deadline so we are optimistic we will be on time.





BIGBURY COFFEE MORNING

On Wednesday 4th June we raised £341 for The Wave Project. Thanks to Dane we were able to watch a short video of their wonderful work for young people and this all takes place down on the beach. It was lovely to have Katie pop in at the end, she had just finished a surfing session down at Bigbury- on-Sea.

On Wednesday 2nd July we raised £358 for the Kingsbridge Outreach Project. It was good to have Miranda and Helen from the Mustard Tree present. Miranda told us about the wonderful 6-8 week sessions free to cancer patients on various topics like cold water swimming, gardening, exercise and well being, bike rides, complementary therapies, benefits advice and counselling.

Many thanks to everyone who supported us and gave so generously. We look forward to seeing you between 10.30 and noon on Wednesday 6th August when we will be supporting Devon Air Ambulance and on Wednesday 3rd September it will be St. Luke's Hospice.

The Morvargh Sailing Project (MSP) is dedicated to empowering young people through sailing. MSP is a youth development organisation that helps young people become more confident, more resilient, more motivated and better able to communicate through volunteer led, life-changing sail training experiences aboard Helen Mary R, a 57ft ketch. By fostering confidence, teamwork, and resilience, Morvargh makes a meaningful difference in the lives of its participants.





Langston House, a beautiful Grade II-listed Georgian farmhouse, opened its gates for the first time on 18th June to host a magical midsummer fundraising evening. The event brought together the local community, celebrated South Devon's finest producers, and raised over £6,500 for the Morvargh Sailing Project, an organisation that empowers young people through life-changing sailing experiences.

The evening began with guests from Kingston, Ringmore and Bigbury exploring Langston's beautifully maintained oneacre gardens. Later, attendees gathered in the magnificently converted Langston Barn studio to enjoy a dinner inspired



by local flavours. The meal, prepared by Tom of Wild Garlic Devon, showcased the best of South Hams' produce, featuring contributions from Rare & Pasture Charcuterie, The Green Deli Newton Ferrers, Mount Folly Farm Bigbury, Scobbiscombe Farm Kingston, Ben's Farm Shop, and Sevenstones Hogget.

Complementing the meal was a locally stocked bar offering Sandridge Barton's Sharpham Wine, Heron Valley Cider, Summerskills Brewery, Salcombe Gin, Hattiers Rum, and Luscombe Drinks, giving guests a true taste of the region.

This special fundraiser was also a moment of celebration for Langston itself. After an extensive and thoughtful restoration, Langston has transformed into a versatile retreat ideal for hosting family holidays, yoga retreats, and

inspirational gatherings.

Estate Manager Holly Rahder shared, "Opening Langston to the community for the first time and seeing the overwhelming support was heartwarming. This evening was about more than fundraising; it was our way of saying thank you to everyone who helped make Langston what it is today while giving back to the young people supported by the Morvargh Sailing Project."

Photographer Erin, of Moments By Erin, captured the magic of the evening, and Orchard Cleaning & Laundry ensured that Langston was presented at its absolute best. Guests also had the opportunity to explore Langston's wider estate, which features the farmhouse, an indoor heated pool, a cinema room, the stunning 100m² barn studio, and converted Byre, surrounded by acres of arable farmland that stretches down to the coast.

Reflecting on the evening's success, Matt Barraud, Founder of the Morvargh Sailing Project, shared, "We're incredibly grateful for the support from Langston and the local community. It was a wonderful evening, and the event has helped us raise crucial funds towards the major refit of our vessel, Helen Mary R, allowing us to continue to provide transformative experiences for young people aboard."



RINGMORE BOOK EXCHANGE

I hope Ringmore residents are still enjoying the facility of the Book Exchange situated in the Church. The intention when I set this up in 2020 was to provide Ringmore with a ready source of reading material during the pandemic and the subsequent withdrawal of the mobile library. I would stress that this is a lending library and when books are not returned it precludes others from the enjoyment of reading them. Sadly the shelves are looking a little depleted of late and maybe some of these books are inadvertently lingering forgotten on peoples bookshelves? Some of the new titles have disappeared within a few days never to be seen again! May I please ask that you have a check? I am hoping to introduce some new titles soon and it would be a shame if everyone didn't have the opportunity to read and enjoy them.

Our quiet country lanes have attracted a certain amount of fly tipping in the past. Recently we have seen two incidents, one near Seven Stone Cross where we saw four dumpy bags of broken slates dumped on the roadside. The second was a car seat deposited in near St Lawrence's Church. Fly tipping is hazardous with regards to health and safety as well as environmental, is unsightly and illegal.

A fly tip is anything that has been dumped in a place that is not a Licenced Waste Transfer Station (recycle centre) and may include: Electrical goods, Furniture, Building waste, Household and/or commercial waste and Clinical and/or chemical waste.

South Hams District Council ask the public to report fly tipping on their portal (link below). When reporting a fly tipping incident please do not go through the item as it might be hazardous and do not remove or move the item as this might affect future prosecutions. When reporting fly tipping things to look out for are:

- Location of the fly tip
- The day, date and time you saw the incident
- How many people were fly-tipping
- What items were fly tipped
- Take photographs of the items or note a description of what they looked like
- What vehicles were used Model, colour and registration

NEW BEGINNINGS AT BANTHAM ESTATE

In early February, the Bantham Estate entered an exciting new chapter. The Estate is now under the care of Chilton Home Farms, a family-run farming company owned by the Aubrey-Fletcher family. As frequent visitors to Bantham over many years, their deep love and

appreciation for this beautiful part of South Devon really show. They are humbled to be able to look after this important landscape and have been truly touched by the warm welcome and support received from the local community.

With so much happening on the Estate over the past few months, it felt like the perfect time to share some updates with you all.

We kicked off the summer with our Estate "Summer Party", a celebration of new beginnings and community. Despite the less-than-ideal weather on the day, spirits weren't dampened. It was a joy to welcome so many of you. Thank you for braving the elements!

Across the Estate, restoration and care have been at the



heart of our efforts. Starting at West Buckland, we have completed a major tidy-up of the old soil heaps that were left from a previous development, and we reinstated the field by the Estate office back to permanent pasture where the poppies have been wonderful this spring. We have also started rebuilding the dry-stone walls along





the road to the beach, breathing new life into these traditional features that help shape the village's character. Our cottages are also getting some well-deserved attention. Work began earlier this year with a new thatch trim - another small step in preserving Bantham's unique identity - and from this week we are repainting our famous run of thatch cottages.



On the farming side, we have installed 4,000 metres of new fencing to support our organic grazing system, with another 4,000 metres planned for next year. We are really proud of our sustainable farming approach, and this work ensures we continue to care for our land in the right way.





This year has also seen another big leap forward in our woodland planting efforts. We have added a new broadleaf plantation at Lower Aunemouth, planting over 3500 trees and bringing our total number of trees planted on the Estate to more than 12,000 since 2019. Previous planting sites include Stiddicombe and Thurlestone Plantation, which are thriving and looking fantastic.

Another new exciting update has been the refurbishment of the Bantham Stores, which is set to reopen any day, just in time for the summer holidays. We're delighted to welcome Darren and George to this new venture and wish them every success. At the same time, we want to extend a heartfelt thank you to Kelly & Linda, who have looked after the shop and the community for the past 10 years. We wish them the very best in their next chapter.

We were also proud to support the Duchy of Cornwall in the successful removal of a small number of abandoned boats at Aveton Gifford. The River Avon holds a special place in the heart of the community and being able to help during this process meant a lot to us.



The boats were removed just in time to welcome over 1,200 swimmers participating in the Bantham Swoosh and Boomerang events organised by Level Water. It was an incredible weekend of swimming and fundraising for a great cause.



Huge thanks to the local community for your patience and support during what was a very busy weekend on the river and around the Estate.

Earlier in the year, we also welcomed Discovery Surf School to Bantham. Discovery are no strangers to South Devon, having started surf lessons in the area over 23 years ago and are already based at Bigbury-on-Sea. We are thrilled to welcome Martin, Annika and their team at Bantham.

Over at the GastroxBoskoBus, this summer you will be able to enjoy some delicious FRITES with a new van joining up the line-up, adding even more delicious options for all our visitors and locals.

Following last year success, our FREE Estate and Vineyard tours arenow back in full swing as well as our school visit which it's been apleasure to host once again. We recently welcomed Thurlestone School for a series of curriculum-linked experiences with pupils from differentage groups with the ultimate goal to connect the next generation tothe land, farming, and the natural world.







And finally, perhaps the most exciting news from the vineyard: we are getting ready to release our 2024 vintage!! It will be available very soon from Bantham directly and at a variety of local shops, including Bantham Stores, Thurlestone, Holywell, Churchstow, Barrel & Still, the Village Inn Pub, and the GastroxBoskoBus.

Community- Ringmore Crafters

Our first meeting was in January 2025. Judith and I wanted to use our knitting, crocheting and quilting experience to do something worthwhile whilst using the opportunity to bring local people together. After quite a bit of research we decided that we wanted to support PUMA (Plymouth Ukraine Medical Aid) charity. PUMA collects essential humanitarian aid and delivers it personally to Ukraine.

As a group we knitted squares and then crocheted them together to produce the two blankets.

Some of us continue to work on blankets and some are currently working on knitted Christmas crackers that will be filled with goodies for Ukrainian children. For those who feel like sewing, we are making small dental hygiene wash bags for donation to Kingsbridge food bank/local refuge. Each one will contain a toothbrush and tooth paste. This project is part of the WI nationwide campaign for dental health. You do not need to be a member of the WI to participate. 

LONGMARSH BOARDWALK

A new boardwalk connecting paths around the saltmarsh at the end of Longmarsh is open allowing residents and visitors to complete a peaceful and beautiful circular walk around the marsh.

The boardwalk creates easy access to view the important habitat and skirts the fragile marshland to protect it. Interpretation signage helps users to understand more about the important saltmarsh habitats on the River Dart.

Funded by the Environment Agency and landowners, South Hams District Council, the boardwalk is part of the wider Saltmarsh Project, which is a collaboration between 13 separate partners and led by the Bioregional Learning Centre.

The Project studies, conserves and restores the saltmarsh along the Dart Estuary between Sharpham and Totnes.

Saltmarshes are habitats along the edge of estuaries which are lie between the highest spring and high tide water levels. As wetlands are tidal, the saltmarshes have a unique range of flora and are very important habitats for young fish, bird and insect species. They also help to improve and filter estuary waters by locking up carbon from the atmosphere and organic matter from the river. They are a protected feature of the estuary's Marine Conservation Zone.

Nature Watch - Local Shieldbugs

Shieldbugs, get their name from their shield-like shape. They are also known as stink bugs, because of their ability to release a foul smell when attacked or squashed. They primarily feed on plant sap using their piercing mouthparts. They are mainly harmless and even beneficial by contributing to overall biodiversity, however a few species can damage crops.



Locally, the Gorse shieldbug, the Common Green shieldbug, Dock Bug and Hairy shieldbug are very common. The much smaller Pied shieldbug, s small black and white shieldbug was common along Toby' path, but none have been seen for the last three years. Also seen, but not so common, the Hawthorn shieldbug and the Western Conifer seed bug



The eggs of shieldbugs tend to be barrel shaped with a crown on top, some species lay a clump of eggs (e.g. Bronze shieldbug) and some lay paired rows, each egg being about 0.1 mm in diameter. On emerging they then go through a series of changes (4 to 5 instars), looking nothing like the parent until the final adult stage.



This year I spotted four sets of Gorse shieldbug eggs on a gorse bush, where I had found one set in 2023. Sadly the 2023 dried up in the sun and never hatched. The image attached is one of the sets this year, from which two eggs hatched. All the others did not hatch and have subsequently shrivelled up. It is very apparent that the changing weather pattern is having a disastrous effect on this branch of nature and thus the food chain.



I have also been daily monitoring some Bronze shield-bug eggs, but it seems these are also not going to hatch. Those who came to Sound & Vision 6 in 2020 may remember the Audio Visual I produced showing a successful hatching of at least twelve out of a batch of fourteen Bronze Shield bugs. Surprisingly, I have not found an adult Bronze shieldbug!







The historic tile floor of St. Lawrence's Church has been beautifully restored, thanks to the ongoing support of the Friends of St. Lawrence's Church (FOSL) and the expert craftsmanship of local artisan Zbigniew "Zibi" Stala.


The floor dating back to the 1800s had suffered from extensive damage, with broken and missing tiles posing safety concerns and detracting from the charm of this much-loved community landmark. Funds raised by FOSL made it possible to undertake a full restoration.

Over four months, Zibi laid more than 3,000 tiles—carefully blending new ones with originals he meticulously restored to preserve the floor's historic character. His masterful work has brought new life to the church while honouring its architectural heritage.

"I'm so happy to have met you all," Zibi shared. "It's been a pleasure working at this beautiful church. Peter [Cook] and Vic [Gubbins] were an amazing help too."

Originally from Poland, Zibi is not only a highly skilled tiler but also an accomplished musician and choreographer. A true perfectionist in everything he does, Zibi has left a lasting legacy at St. Lawrence's—not only by restoring its floor, but by becoming part of its story.

RELAX!



August is here, the children are on holiday and families head off in all directions in search a good time, preferably in good weather. Holidays allow us to go places, and do things we enjoy doing, without having to worry about work, routines and schedules. Then hopefully refreshed, and with batteries recharged, we will be ready for the hustle and bustle and the grey days of winter, ahead. The idea is to relax in the way that suits us best, but sometimes this may be hard to achieve with road works gridlocked motorways and local traffic jams.

In Genesis we read that God took six days to create the world, and rested on the seventh. It is said that the ancient rabbis used to teach that it was on that day that he created tranquility, peace, serenity and repose, and that it was then and only then that creation was complete.

We know that we all feel the better for rest and relaxation, but we live in a world where busyness is the order of the day; where it is often assumed that doing something, no matter what it is, is better than nothing. Many people see rest as an intrusion into a busy and fulfilling life so that when they do take time off they cannot settle and spend the time watching the clock, fidgeting and pottering about wondering what is going on back home in their absence. But constant activity without rest leaves us overtired and stressed, with the result that we respond to people and situations from a survival mode where everything seems overwhelming and more urgent than it really is.

The Gospels bear witness to the fact that Jesus would often take time off away from the crowds who constantly followed him around. Although he was always ready to respond to anyone who was in trouble of any kind, he always knew when it was time to stop, to reflect, rest, pray and spend time alone with God. Then he would look for a quiet place where he could be on his own, and uninterrupted. Sometimes he would get into a boat and cross the lake or sea; at other times he would go into the desert regions, or up into the hills. Jesus knew that the effectiveness of his ministry would be reduced if he was physically, emotionally or spiritually exhausted.

Maybe we need to remind ourselves of this next time when we are rushing around trying to cram as many things as possible into a short space of time. Whether we choose to go away on holiday or not, we all need to take time out from the normal rhythms of life, to rest, relax, pray, develop our personal relationship with God and renew our spiritual strength.

It all happened before the annual Bantham Swoosh took place, making it much safer for swimmers.

encourage local farmers and landowners to express their interest in joining in with the BLUEprint project. Exhibitions at agricultural shows in Yealmpton and Kingsbridge this summer will enable farmers to find out how BLUEprint could help them fund Nature-based Solutions to agricultural run-off from their land. This comes as a bonus when Government generally seems to be cutting back on grants for environmentally sensitive farming. BLUEprint is an amazing opportunity to keep environmental ambitions alive and kicking in our local river valleys and estuaries.

Sewage overspills and waste water contaminated with microplastics and forever chemicals remain a serious concern. Addressing this problem requires continued political pressure on South West Water as well as considerable behaviour change in the way we all continue to use our toilets and drains as 'rubbish disposal' networks. It is likely that many of us are unwittingly contributing to the problem. We need to learn more about how our actions compound a problem caused by poor investment by SWW in the infrastructure needed to serve its customers and comply with its Discharge Permits.

The Steering Group are making presentations to local parish councils to invite them to send one representative to the River Summit to find out how they can form River Water Quality Groups to work with their local river champions - Avon River Champions, Friends of Salcombe Kingsbridge Estuary and Sustainable Blackawton,

The CEO of SWW, Susan Davy, resigned in July because of political and public pressure. Following a 2-year investigation by the Environment Agency into the noncompliance of SWW with its Discharge Permits in Cornwall, Ofwat required SWW to invest an additional £24 million from investors and reserves (not customers!) to upgrade its treatment works. As the Devon County Councillor for many of the parishes along the banks of the River Avon, I will be pressing Devon County Council to do the same for Devon.

The key consultation with all stakeholders will be at the River Summit to be held at Kingsbridge Community College on Saturday 4th October. Between now and the River Summit, the BLUEprint project will use existing data and various programmes to identify potential places along our waterways that could benefit from the installation of Nature-based Solutions to agricultural run-off. The process will review existing data from years of local water quality testing by the Environment Agency which classifies each section of our rivers (water bodies) as having either Excellent, Good, Moderate, or Poor Ecological Status (i.e. how full of life the river is). This data will be cross referenced with habitat, land use and topographical maps which together will pinpoint areas which could benefit from leaky dams, silt traps, animal proof fencing or tree planting along river buffer zones. BLUEprint Farmers can join in the next phase of this project (worth from £500,000 to £2million) to install what they agree is needed to protect their section of the water ways from agricultural run-off.

In the meantime, the Steering Group for the BLUEprint for Rivers project are steaming ahead with the engagement programme which is bringing together all sectors in the many parishes along the valleys and fields surrounding the River Avon, River Gara and Slapton Ley and the Kingsbridge Salcombe Estuary. Key stakeholders are community groups, parish and town councils, businesses, schools, organisations, farmers and landowners.

Bigbury Net Zero



Most of us tune in to the local weather forecast because we trust the Met Office. These respected professionals agree – the climate is changing, and it is changing because of the gaseous emissions we produce from burning fossil fuels to release the energy we use. Collectively, we need to shift to more renewable energy to slow down the worst

effects of climate change – rising seas levels, floods, extreme temperatures, higher winter rainfall and damage to lives, crops, buildings, roads, businesses and our economy.

Not everyone can afford to do this right now. Those of us who can afford to do this, should do it, because we probably have a higher carbon footprint than those who cannot afford to switch. Low-income families will not need to do as much as high income families. If we all do what we can – then we move towards net zero. It's a balancing act.

It is a sad reflection of our times that politicians sometimes speak with forked tongues because they have an agenda that they are not sharing with us. Usually, the back story is that they want to be elected and benefit from the power that brings with it – to make our national culture and economics fit their political or personal ambitions. Our political response to climate change is fast becoming that political hot potato which is appalling to watch. Many people no longer trust politicians as a result but are equally easily persuaded by social media which is far more sinister in its manipulation of the truth about climate change. 'Climate change deniers' are a dangerously misinformed group who have the potential to accelerate climate change.

The term 'net zero' simply means that we cooperate on a regional scale (household, parish, County, nation) to reduce our reliance on fossil fuel wherever technically and economically possible. If the overall balance is that together we are not increasing the harmful emissions that lead to rising temperatures – that's an acceptable result. Its 'net zero'.

As your Devon County Councillor, I am working with the Cabinet Member for Rural Affairs & Broadband (ClIr Cheryl Cottle-Hunkin) to explore all available options. 
and Englishmen" to the America of Cole Porter who wrote "Miss Otis Regrets she's unable to lunch today".
