

Bringing the Community Together

Firstly, I hope you've all had a great Summer.

At the Hall we've been planning our Autumn/Winter programme. The first event, which at the time of writing is yet to take place, was a return visit from top locally based folk duo Harbottle and Jonas. Tickets are selling well.

We have two events in November. The first is the latest in our ever popular series of Film and Food Nights, on the 13th. This time the film is The Penguin Lessons, starring Steve Coogan and Jonathan Pryce. This 2024 comedy has only recently been released in cinemas and is the story of a British teacher rescuing a distressed penguin in Argentina and their subsequent adventures. As usual, entry is free; just bring a plate of food to share and your own drinks.

The second is a Villages in Action event, No One is Listening, a production by master story teller Vic Llewellyn, on the 29th. Drawing on the traditions of ghost stories, and his own distinctive comic style, Vic weaves a semi-autobiographical tale of haunted journeys, lost friends and the slow unraveling of memory. At its heart is an actor facing the loss of his most treasured possession: his memory. Look out for ticket details in Bigbury Drums.

The last event before Christmas is a Wine Tasting Evening on December 5th, presented by Dane Vanstone together with Mike Poynter and Cathy Harrington. Tickets are £15, including delicious finger food. Again, further details will appear in Bigbury Drums nearer the time.




Play Park Opening and Children's Party.

Five-year Review


Neighbourhood planning provides the opportunity for communities to set out a positive vision for how they want their community to develop over the next 10, 15, 20 years in ways that meet identified local need and make sense for local people. As needs and circumstances change there is a need to review and adapt the NHP. Bigbury's NHP was published in 2020 and has had numerous positive outcomes e.g. the affordable housing development at Holywell Meadow. After five years it is time to review the plan.

What is changing? In recent years, South Hams District Council declared a housing crisis and also a climate change and biodiversity emergency. On a very local level our churchyard is full and nowhere to bury our dead. There is limited car parking for church events and no toilet. How should these impact on our NHP?

Members of the public are invited to review and comment on Bigbury's Neighbourhood Plan as part of the Fiveyear review. Please leave your comments on the Bigbury Community website, email or write to the parish clerk by Friday 24 October 2025.



Roses came from Kenya, courtesy of Henry and Louise Wainwright's links, highlighting the Diocesan connections there. WELL DONE ALL.

By the time you read this, a six man jazz band from Holland will have given a free concert in the church, again thanks to Henry's jazz club connections, do hope you came and enjoyed the music! We may also have chosen a new vicar – interviews were being held in late September – watch this space! Archdeacon Dettmer led a service at St Lawrence on August 3rd and apparently commented to our churchwarden Bryan Carson afterwards, what a pleasure it had been to have been able to chat with congregation members over tea after - free refreshments and chat time to catch up on news is one of St Lawrence's guiet strenaths!

A Quintennial Inspection (church MOT) is programmed for early October. We expect the church architect to be impressed by all the improvements that have happened with your support - since 2020!



The flower festival was supported by a range of home and visiting bell ringers. Every morning the Bigbury bell ringers opened the festival at 10 am with about 30 minutes of ringing. On Saturday morning we had an open session where visitors and novices were allowed to "have a go". Between 20 and 30 had a go and this session lasted a good 2 hours. On Sunday the ringers brought the festival to a close with ringing immediately before Evensong at 6 pm.




Bigbury Church Bells mark VJ Day

On Friday 15 August the country marked VJ day in numerous ceremonies up and down the country to pay tribute to those involved in the second world war. The ringing of church bells are an important means by which such events are commemorated. In Bigbury's small way a round of ringing was undertaken at 12.05 hrs, after the 2 minute silence that was held across the nation. Ours was a much more modest affair in comparison to the Exeter Cathedral ringers who rang a full peal involving 5,040 changes at Salcombe Holy Trinity Church that lasted over 3 hours.

The use of the "V" as a symbol of resistance became widespread throughout the Allied forces. Originally Victor de Laveleye, a Belgian radio producer, who saw this as unifying the Flemish and French speakers. He picked "V" because it was the first letter of the French word Victoire (victory) and the Flemish word Vrijheid (freedom). In January

Found the article on road safety interesting, would have been helpful to promote safety on children playing in the roads, it seems to be a past time in most residential streets and lanes. Years ago playing in streets was safer, vehicles were louder, could be heard further away, vehicles including petrol etc have become much quieter meaning risks have increased, sadly legislation has not caught up meaning children are at greater risk of harm from possible accidents. WE will have to wait til Parliament introduces the much needed control ensuring that parents also are held accountable if rules are not followed

On Night-Time-Noise, there are things that can be purchased to help restrict the spread of sound. Keeping windows closed too blocking caps that would otherwise allow sound molecules to cause a nuisance. We use things such as Base-Dampers, Acoustic Panels etc that also act as furniture too. If you own a property there are sound dampeners that can be used in lofts etc. In places that have neighbours above them there are sound proof matting that helps stop the sound of televisions etc being heard meaning sound can be contained.

Here where we live, often we get noise from the Pickwick Pub and at times groups at Chaplecombe Camping Site playing all manner of instruments along with singalongs.

We generally accept such noise as one of those things, we find by avoiding complaints about others we have a peaceful life. However we ourselves always especially at night, ensure our windows, doors etc are kept closed,a void sound usage in rooms next to neighbours partition walls. It means the use of our home is restrictive, but

we must ensure we use professional products to stop sound pollution. Sadly we do hear our other neighbours, as we do not get on with them it is safer not to complain including loud parties that do come from their homes.

Also, the Council Environmental Department have equipment to help measure noise, in the past we have asked neighbours if they are willing to have monitoring equipment to establish facts, so all parties affected with noise can adjust including obtaining any sound proofing equipment can be obtained. Sound problems can always be resolved provided we know all facts. People have to pull and work together to resolve issues in a balanced healthy and peaceful way, complaints are not always the way. Together we can survive.

Belles in the Tower

For a long time, bell ringing has been a male preserve. You only have to look at the photograph of Bigbury bell ringers in 1960 to see all the ringers were men. One of Bigbury's first women ringers was Ellen Bardens who was ringing in the 1970s however that was more an exception than the rule. Fast forward to today and at least 50% of the regular ringers are ladies at Bigbury. However, a constant feature of the bell ringing community is the camaraderie and the willingness to help. Well on Sunday 27 July, when Kingston said they were a bit short of ringers for their Sunday service a couple of Bigbury belles went along to help ring out. Unusually all the ringers were ladies so on that morning Kingston bell tower was definitely a place where angels feared to tread!



In Memory of Carol Pink

I expect many of you will remember Carol Pink who lived on Ringmore Drive in Bigbury on sea. She had been at Kahala Court Residential Home in Kingsbridge since 2016 and it was there that she passed away in August. Carol and I had been close friends since she moved to Bigbury with her husband Keith in 1995, but in fact our families had been linked well before then. Her parents moved to Kingsbridge in 1936 when Carol was four, and her father became the minister at the Baptist Church in the town. During the war the family took my father in when he had been given compassionate leave from the army. My dad's parents had been killed in a bombing raid in Kingsbridge in January 1943, their jeweller's shop was a direct hit, it was where the Royal Mail sorting office is now. There was nothing left, and he had no family. In fact, Carol's father assisted at the marriage service of my parents in Worthing with Carol being Mum's bridesmaid. See photo.

After Carol and Keith moved down to Bigbury on Sea, we quickly formed our friendship. She loved coming to church with me and being able to worship at the same place as when she was growing up. She also joined in the Church house group meeting up at the farm. For Carol, her Christian faith was so important to her. She embraced village life, coffee mornings, friends and neighbours etc. She enjoyed painting classes with Mary Smallwood and also she wrote the series of articles in Bigbury News, entitled "Carol's war" in 2007, remembering earlier years growing up in Kingsbridge during the war. She and Keith would often be seen in the village picking up litter, which they did for several years.

Although Carol had moved into Kahala Court, mainly due to her failing eyesight and losing Keith the year before, she was always positive and cheerful. The staff enjoyed caring for her over the nine years she was there. I am thankful for the friendship we had, the person that she was, and being able to share these memories with you.




Bigbury Net Zero

Do you think that people hear what they want to hear? Is this why sneaky gremlin 'social media algorithms' were invented? They learn what we are asking Google or searching for on Facebook, so that more of the content we appear to be interested in, is presented to us every time

we log on? This keeps us engaged and exposes us to the advertising which also pops up on our screens. The gremlins will soon sensationalise and emotionally charge the content to keep our attention and potentially amplify misinformation. Sadly, this addiction to social media can orchestrate social division by polarising views on any topic – from immigration to renewable energy.

The demonising of the term 'net zero' is an example of this process. Net zero simply means that where we can make cuts in carbon emissions we do so, and where it's not possible we don't. In the end we aim to balance what's possible with what is not possible, and the result is just enough cuts to carbon emissions to stave off the worst effects of global warming. Global warming is the single biggest threat to sustainable communities that we have ever faced. That's why it has been defined as an 'Emergency'. Emergency does not mean 'business as usual'. There is nothing 'outstandingly beautiful' about climate change. It will impact on food security, increase migration and the risk of floods and drought.




The proposed Bigbury turbine has been a hot topic this summer. The planning application by Octopus was withdrawn because the cost of financing this small project from the retail sector became too high. Local people supported the proposed turbine in Bigbury, as evidenced by 81% support in the Octopus public consultation and 77.5% support letters on the SHDC Planning Portal. Most people understand the term 'Emergency' and the urgent need to reduce the reliance of our communities on fossil fuels, particularly oil-fired heating systems. Of the 16 parishes in the Salcombe electoral division, there are only four parishes which do not have access to mains gas -Bigbury, Kingston, Ringmore and Aveton Gifford. By coincidence, these parishes would have benefited from the proposed energy discounts offered by the Octopus Fan Club subscribers to the Bigbury turbine. We are in a costof-living crisis which could get worse - energy savings are critical for families struggling to make ends meet.

Although mains gas is still a fossil fuel, which also contributes to global warming, it is considered a 'bridging fossil fuel' because its carbon footprint is lower than oil, but not as low as electricity. In 2024, renewable energy sources generated 50.4% of our electricity. So, whilst switching to electricity is the most climate-sensitive option, switching to mains gas is better than using oil-fired heating. But we don't all have access to mains gas here and are heavily reliant on oil.

According to Exeter University's Parish Carbon Calculator, the energy dependency of the four 'orphan parishes' in the Salcombe Electoral Division (i.e. no mains gas) is: **KINGSTON**: oil (71%) LPG (9%), mains gas (0%) electricity (20%); **RINGMORE** oil (61%) LPG (11%), mains gas (0%) electricity (29%); **BIGBURY**: oil (58%) LPG (15%), mains gas (0%) electricity (27%); **AVETON GIFFORD**: oil (51%) LPG (13%), mains gas (0%), coal (11%) electricity (26%;)

If a unique opportunity arises to switch from oil to electricity, such as a local source of renewable energy that costs less money too, then we should support it.



Rivers of Hope

How many times this summer have we heard those 'pollution alerts' and been advised not to swim in the sea or rivers? How many times have we had serious floods and mudslides this summer, destroying property and

causing serious disruptions to traffic? It's not even the winter yet – and the answer to those questions is 'far too many times'! This problem will only get worse because of climate change and human beings are driving climate change without seeming regard for future generations. Something must change.

We all listen to the Met Office weather warnings because we trust them, don't we? Climate change will increase UK winter rainfall, with a potential rise of up to 30% wetter winters by 2070 compared to 1990 levels, and there has been an overall 16% increase between 2015-2024. Rainfall periods could also be more intense in the future – giving us very little time to react. So we need to make a plan in advance. Running hand in hand with dramatically reducing the burning of fossil fuels in our community – we must also make a serious effort to make an Emergency Plan to including a Flood Risk Management Plan. Only 72 parishes in Devon, of the 362 parishes have a **Flood Risk Management Plan**. All plans over 5 years old, need to be reviewed. Bigbury Parish Council will consider this at their next Parish Council meeting.



It is probably easier to blame someone else for the problems we face, than it is to admit some responsibility for the outcome that we find so annoying. Is there



something more that we could do as households and communities to reduce the amount of pollution that is ending up in our rivers and estuaries? Is there something that our local government (parish and town councils, District Councils and County Council) could do better to prevent more development increasing pressure on poor sewage and drainage systems and what is it that farmers and landowners can do better to reduce agricultural runoff? How can we work together to design a collaborative plan that makes the health of our rivers and seas a priority?

Why not let national government sort out South West Water? They seem to have them in their sights now. Let's explore if there is something we can all do here and now to reduce our pressure on an inadequate sewage and waste water treatment system. The BLUEPrint Project is bringing together stakeholders in the River Avon, River Gara & Slapton Ley and the Salcombe Kingsbridge Estuary to develop a bid for between £500,000 and £2 million to clean up these water ways.
